3-Day Course overview:

The overall feedback from servers, AT's and students was very positive. Following are comments from students and servers.

- Awning for dhamma hall
- Arrange both courses so they do not occur on a long weekend
- Consider a spring and fall course (early July, late August/early September)
- Need to contain the dust
- Partition between pump house and container and servers area
- Drop down panel on dinning hall tents to limit wind flow and visual barrier
- Extending pump house deck or build a separate deck for food prep area
- Allow students to care for the cleaning/sterilizing/air dry their own dishes

- Have students do their own dishes and place them back at their own eating station
- Our situation required that we cover the dishes with a cloth and secure cover for protection from dust and critters.
- Relocate gong to different area ie: nearer to tents
- Safer area around women's outhouse
- Consider building more outhouses instead of rentals
- Insure proper clean up occurs after each course just as we would at a centre
- Need better water supply to wash area and emptying waste water

NOTE: A "3-day course committee meeting" will take place in early September with recommendations for future courses to be offered on the land

Insurance for the container – This is been requested from our insurance company and we are waiting to hear back how much our policy is increased. We will definitely insure the container.

International newsletter – sent to international committee, we are slated for the October issue and will be combined with Vancouver Dhamma Hall and Dhamma Surabhi news.

Fall Newsletter – put off for now until we see what changes the International Committee has to our draft.

Website – blog entries – Carsten has offered to do some blog entries.

Facebook – entries where made regarding the 3-day courses.

Copy.com - Arnie will continue with this.

Outreach – Currently searching for a site in Victoria for day sits

Water Report – BC Aquifer pumped to the well on July 30, 2014. The water was cloudy throughout the test with no sand detected. The rate decreased from 4 US gallons per minute to 1 US gallons per minute during the pumping. The water level had increased by 1 m. So the well is 1 m shallower after they finish the testing. They are assuming that sand has packed into the hole. They recommended that we contact the original driller to see about redeveloping the well or using a gravel pack. The water samples indicated a very high pH, but still drinkable, high iron, and high manganese. The water committee consisting of Evie, Arnis, Steve, and Carsten will make recommendations about whether to proceed with this well, and will also look at the cost of bringing the water up from the shallow well.

Truck Insurance – It was agreed upon to keep the insurance for one more month to assist with the fall service period.

Operations – Carsten will choose a date for a service period in September and send this date to Robert and Doug.

Salmon enhancement – Carsten would like to replicate the enhancement that was done on Greg's land on our property. He will contact various agencies, including the Salmon Enhancement Society to begin exploring this idea and then report to the trust.

For **future purchases** Hope will be the contact person for BC Asset Recovery.

Minutes of 1st Meeting (Agenda in black; meeting minutes in blue)

Friday, May 16, 2014

Attending: Deb Harding, Hope Funk, Don Williams, Steve Armstrong, Daniel Gomez, Evie Chauncey

To decide on/plan:

People stuff:

- Do an Invitation letter or post on website or BC newsletter?
Decision to do a BC newsletter, and post on the website. Reviewed the newsletter draft and made changes to it.
Reviewed the Draft budget as well because the numbers are in the newsletter.
- Jim Swift has coordinated almost all of the set up for the Dhamma Modana registration site. This is never been used before because we have always piggybacked on Dhamma Surahbi. However this is the 1st course we are running on Dhamma Modana land, so we want the Dhamma Modana a registration site to be functional.
- Review confirmation letter: need to let people know they need to be self-sufficient. They need to bring a flashlight, warm bedding, their own mattress, toothpaste, alarm clock, back jack if needed, sitting cushions. Need to know showering situation. Could bring a comfortable camping chair if they desire.
Reviewed the acceptance letters.
- Book ATs-male course-Daniel, backed up by Steve; female course -Lorena Havens or Jenny.
- After a long discussion about the layout, and the fact that we do not need to use the 2nd door due to one gender, and that the shelving on the women's side will be gone, but considering it will be hot, and that 40 felt very crowded when we had the inaugural sitting we decided to cap the students at 30. 5 to 6 servers.
- Daniel will do special handling after June 22.
- Decided to run a short 3 day course, with 1st METTA after the group sitting in the morning on day 3, and in the afternoon, the group sitting 2-3 PM, with a final discourse in METTA 315-4:15 PM. Course closing at 4:30 PM on day 3.

Layout

- Proposal to use a container: a lot of discussion about the container. Steve has called a number of companies selling containers and the least expensive commercial ones are on Keating crossroads. There are roughly \$5000 for a 40 foot unit, delivered. However, for \$6900, we could get one that would be insulated and could easily use it for a walk-in cooler and the kitchen. We would want to have double doors on either side for accessibility. Later Deb talked to her brother, Mike Hughes who was welding Windows into a container, and said it was a very very difficult to do so. He recommended we buy one with the work already done on. Steve will do more research for the next meeting.

Self-contained:

- Long discussion about whether cooking should have been a Daniel's house and up at the pump house on the land, or whether the course should be self-contained. In the end it was decided to do all of the

cooking up on the land, but not be rigid about the course being self-contained. In other words, people can comment deliver groceries, or bring up water, etc.

- Don said that we have 35 cushions, so we do not need to get any from Vancouver.

Updates: newsletter sent to 5934 BC students; registration module now working for DM; current registration 33 women + 4 servers; 8 men-; ATs for courses Daniel for men's, and Lorena Havens for women; SH for course is covered;

Task list review-all tasks completed except that Hope will continue to research dishes, and Steve and Robert will continue to research containers.

Discussion items:

- Courses:
 - Cap on courses @ 30, what to do about waitlist? 34
 - what to do if there are only 10 men? Yes, we will run the course even if there are no men. The 1st course is a trial. We will need to sort out how the cooking works etc.
 - What about no male servers? There are enough men willing to serve-possibly Steve, Doug Cooper, Robert so we will be fine.
- Pump house
 - Recommendation for Kyle to construct to be given to Trust-Greg can no longer complete the pumphouse because he is an 8 feet and the guidelines are that an AT cannot be paid by a Vipassana

organization. We were paying Greg \$20 an hour. Kyle is willing to work for \$15 an hour. Had Greg been finishing the work, Greg was going to suggest hiring a plumber instead of his doing the plumbing, and he recommends the Kyle does the same.

Kyle can work on the pumphouse during the work period next Thursday and Friday.

Request approval from the trust to approve Kyle Althaus to work on the pump house. (Total of \$3000 already approved previously by the Trust.) Approved by Trust at trust meeting 6/8/2014.

Requesting approval to hire a plumber with a cap of \$1200. Approved by Trust at Trust meeting 6/8/2014.

Shower layout-agreement from the committee to construct the showers on the backside of the pumphouse, side-by-side. The committee had no preference about whether the sinks were in between the showers or on either side of the showers.

Dishwasher was discussed. It will be too small to run the dishes for 40 people, so it was suggested that we have the normal 3 tub layout in the dining area for students to rinse their dishes, and a further wash up by the servers including a chlorine rinse. We will plumb in the dishwasher so that it can be used for smaller courses.

Graywater drainage was discussed from the pumphouse. We will ask Kyle to have Randy dig out a hole, within the bear fencing. This will be filled with gravel, and then have a runoff. Further discussion will happen about this at the workperiod.

- Container review-and recommendation to Trust? Robert called VanIsle, and spoke to them. They do have smaller containers. Kyle is also found several containers in LC. Steve and Robert will continue to do research. It looks like it is not as difficult as we had originally thought to put in doors and windows. This could be done by professional welder. Instead of insulating the ceiling, we could build a roof over the container-like a shed roof. It would be helpful to have the container in place before the three-day courses, so that we could use it for food prep, storage, and as an ongoing workshop, but it is not critical. We would like to recommend to the trust that they approve of the container in principle, but that we do not put a price on it until further research is done. At that point, the trust would need to approve of the price. If we do have the containers, we can put the dining Hall as a tarp off of the container.

We would like to recommend to the trust that they approve of the container in principle.

- Site layout- There will only be one area now developed for a camping area-on the women's side. The backhoe will clear a little bit further into the woods so that some of the tents can be in a shady area. The bear fence will still be able to go around this.
- Dining area will require construction-either freestanding on posts, or off of the container. If we have the container, it will be sited near the pump house.

- AT accommodations: the 2 suggestions are 2 rent Kyle's motorhome, or we will use 10 x 10 tent from Hope.
- Power will not be run over to the Dhamma Hall, because the needs of running the audio system are so low. It can be supported by Steve's and Tim's battery pack. We will have some low-level lighting because it will be dark in the early hours of the morning, and by 9:30 AM.
- Solar lighting will be placed along the walkways.
- Port-a-potties-if the men's numbers are still low, we will just use the 2 outhouses. We will definitely get 2 extra port-a-potties for the women's course, and will decide according to the men's registration numbers.
- Tables and chairs-We decided to buy folding tables, rather than build wooden ones. We prefer the 6' x 2' over the 8' x2' because they are much lighter. We need approximately 10 tables-1 for registration, one for prep, one for wash up, one for serving, and 5 for eating. This is figuring 6 students per table. 3 on each side. At the next meeting we can see how many can be loaned. We decided to buy 50 plastic chairs. We will look into either folding or stacking ones.
- Dishes: we will get dishes for 50 people. We now have 50 small plates. We will buy mugs, bowls, cutlery, and mixing bowls.
- Fridges-we have 2. Steve is going to research using a freezer as a fridge, because Robert has an extra freezer.
- Water-we will buy a 500 L food grade container for the back of the truck, instead of a 1000 L, so that we do not damage the truck. We will have a 1000 L food grade tank at the pump house which we will fill.
- Cooking: we talked about using one stove in the pump house. They only had 2 stoves at Sprinston and for 40-50 people. If we added an outdoor3 burner propane cooking device, and used the rice cooker, we would be fine with the one stove. So cooking would be possible up on the land without using Daniel's cabin.
- Hope and Don have already put in 17 hours inventoring what we have left from Sprinston. They have another day to finish.
- Work period planning-Robert and Steve have been to the site, and planned for the workperiod. Report will be made by Operations.
- Budget review

Draft of a budget for the 3 day courses:

Storage container \$5000-8000

Porta-potties rental***** (for 4) \$560 (last year, so say \$600)

Food related infrastructure-propane cooking devise, water tanks \$500

Food \$1,000

Dishes/ cooking pans/serving pans \$500

Chairs, tables, tarps for the tents or building materials \$800

BC Aquifer pump rental \$200

Xeroxing, displays \$250

(didn't count truck insurance. \$638. Covered by contingency, but should be counted as part of the budget approval process because it is over \$500)

Total: 8,850-11,850

10% contingency \$1185

Total: 9735-13,035 so say \$10,000-\$13,000

- The food for the three-day course was calculated for 35 people, 30 students + 5 servers, at \$7 per person per day = \$735 but we will not be able to buy the kind of bulk we have bought before, so say \$1000.
- So for 2 courses, we would need to add in the food and port-a-potties 2 times, so add in \$1600.

For 2 courses: \$11,600-14,600, including \$ 5-8000 per container. If we take out the container, this would be \$6500.

Request approval from the trust to spend \$6500 on the course. Approved at 6/8/2014 Trust Meeting.

Requested approval to use a container on the meditation site. Approved by Trust. 6/8/2014. Purchase container will be presented in the future as a separate expense.

Finishing the pumphouse: Total cost remaining: \$1000 labour (6 days, 3 for plumbing, 3 for cabinetry), \$300 for plumbing, \$300-\$1200 for cabinetry (depending on availability of good used buys or new), \$200 for showers and toothbrushing station, \$300? BC Aquifer bill. So about \$2100-\$3000.[Probably more for plumbing now that we plan to hire a plumber.]

This has previously been approved by the trust. Do we need to renew that approval? No. Trust this fine with this expense.

- 2 fridges, stove, hood vent have all been donated. A dishwasher will be loaned.

The average dana on a course like this could be about \$100 per person, though I suspect it would be higher on this inaugural course. So the dana that we could receive would be roughly $30 \times 100 = \$3000$. (In calculating dana, one doesn't include the servers). For 2 courses, if one of them is small, and only has 10 students, this would be \$1000, with a total of approximately \$4,000. But we have no idea.

Note 1 Cistern-Don wanted to know the size of cistern that we would need. We did some water calculations. We think we would be using a maximum of 30 gallons per person per day, with 30 students on-site, that is 900 gallons/day, for three days, a total of 2700 gallons. If the pump was running 12 hours a day, at 2 gallons a minute, that would be 1440 gallons. So we could fill this in 2 days. It is probably our best interest to rent a cistern, or several of them depending on how hard it is to move them around.

Note 2 Tent site review-a preliminary layout was discussed. The Dining Hall will be quite near the pump house. That will make it easier for food transferring and for extension cords for the urns and toasters. We will move the men's outhouse over to the west side of the men's tenting area. Kyle will need to know the layout fairly quickly so he can start putting wood chips on the campsite.

Note 4 Tents for dining: we discussed a look at a number of samples, and tentatively decided one from Canadian Tire, about \$250. **Bob** further research and buy 2 if necessary. **Bob**, check with Kyle, because he might have a tent source. **Greg said:** You can borrow my 10x10 vendor tent (comes with sides) so may only need to buy one. Bob and Jenny's thought they bought from Walmart? is still in my outhouse. One strut is broken but it will go up.

- Other Canopies -see if we can borrow David and Ni's, Bob and Jenny's (BJJ said yes)

- Tent size, Hope pointed out the getting a 12' x 16' tent was more expensive and they are generally more difficult to put up. So she had suggested that we link together 2 10 x 10 tents. Jenny did a layout, that is possible to use two 10 x 10 tents for each gender, and use 2 10 x 10 tents for serving, which would be 6 tents. We will see if we can borrow them.

Note 5 Tables and chairs-**Don. Greg said**: You can borrow my picnic table. Heavy but will easily seat six. There is also a small table for 4 in the pumphouse. There are two chairs and if Daniel is back (or if he isn't) can probably borrow 2-3 more from the cottage. **ell** Hope how many tables we need, (4 tables 6' x 2',) so she can buy them at Costco. Tables and chairs: Don had done an investigation into renting tables, and we decided that it would be better to purchase 4 tables 6' x 2', at Costco-the white fold up kind These we could store in the Dhamma Hall over the winter, and use the 2 8 feet wood tables we already have at the Hall for food serving. Don found out that at the cheapest place to rent, is \$4.50 to rent a chair for the course time. For 25 chairs, that would be \$125. We decided instead of renting chairs, or buying stools from IKEA, which we had considered, to instead cut up some logs, and put little pieces of pressboard on them and make our chairs.

Note hot water urns: we still have the old ones at Dhamma Surabhi in the fire hose storage behind the paper shed. **Evie**: Ask Hope if we have any. We have all the other kitchen supplies we need except for plates and cutlery.

Note 6 Portapotty information: I called to a number of companies in Duncan, and Coast Environment, which is also the same as Coast Portable, rents to Portapotties. The Portapotties include a hand sanitizer. Their phone number is 250-746-0146, or 250-748-4611. They only deliver on Tuesdays, and pick up on Tuesdays. Three Portapotties needed . The pickup, delivery, disposal of waste, and sanitizers, and HST will cost \$403.20

Outhouses- Outhouses/portapotty/ composting toilets

a) report from Bob on Vancouver Island Health Authority. Upon the request of Nino Marino, the CVRD Bylaw officer, Bob called the Vancouver Island Health Authority to discuss Portapotties and outhouses on the land. The gentleman he spoke to said that either was fine, but he refused to put this in writing. That official is going to call Nino and try to figure out why Nino asked us to check this out.

b) We also discussed composting toilets, which Kyle kindly offered to set up. Don Jenny and I all thought that because we are zoned public assembly, we should not be moving around human waste. There was also some concern that the high volume of urine would smell.

c) outhouses-we decided that it would be a good idea to accept Greg's offer for a 2nd outhouse and put that on the men's side. Steve had offered to build 2 more outhouses, and we are suggesting these go on the women's side, as the double outhouse. **Steve** is thinking to see if we can build 3 more. Then we might not need portapotties. Costs \$250 per outhouse. Further discussion needed. We can borrow Greg's outhouse and maybe Rooster's as well.

Note 7 Dishes -We have the plates, which are a small size plate, but will be satisfactory. We will need bowls and cups. We need to count how many cups are already at the center, and between us we will loan a enough cups to make up the difference. We decided that once we get the inventory from hope about what is in the Shawnigan Lake materials, we will see what we can each donate, and label it with a colored tape.

Note Budget 8 The budget as presented by Evie was agreed to by the trust. It was agreed to allow the treasurer to pay for those tasks listed in the budget without needing approval from the trust for item by item. The food for the three-day course was calculated for 40 people, 35 students + 5 servers, at \$7 per person per day.

The average dana on a course like this is about \$150/person, though I suspect it would be higher on this inaugural course. So the dana that we could receive would be roughly $35 \times 150 = 5250$. (In calculating dana, one doesn't include the servers).

Conforming with the Bylaws Note 10

We investigated the following issues to make sure we are in conformance with the current bylaws:

1. Adding a veranda through the pump house. The square footage of a temporary building is defined by the exterior walls. So according to the bylaws, we can add a veranda to the pump house
2. Use of the pump house-we read the bylaws, and we are allowed one outbuilding for a pump house, which must a specific size, and be used exclusively for the use of the water system. So it would not be in compliance to keep the stove and fridge in the pump house. We call the CVRD, and then wrote a letter to them, describing our intention for 3 days of camping, and asking if we can put a temporary stove and fridge in the pump house and then remove it after the camping. Another alternative is to put them in outside on the veranda, but we must certainly remove them after the course. We will comply with what they advise.
3. Camping-it is clear we cannot put an RV vehicle on the land if it has any cooking facilities, which was something we had considered. We asked the CVRD for clarification, though it seems clear from reading the bylaws that camping is allowed.
4. Height-we checked that one story is defined by the ceiling, so the storage loft in the pump house is fine.

Note 12 Dishwashing protocol

It was discussed that it would be good not to have any food scraps dumped inside the property line. So the suggestion is that the washing water that the students use for their place in the dining hall be brought to the sink in the pump house. The sink would hook up to the dishwasher inside the pumphouse, and to the sinks outside on the deck. the showers would be hooked into the same line, which would be a 3 inch pipe that would drain outside the boundary in the swale for the septic tanks are going to go. **Action item: talk to Greg and see if he approves-done**

Note 13 hot water heaters- Kyle calculated that with a low flow showerhead, the flow would be one and a half gallons for men. So for 2 showers, we would need at least 3 gallons per minute. If we add outdoor sinks, then we would need over 4 gallons per minute. For \$760 we can buy an on demand hot water tank, that would take very little space. It was a decision to also put a separate unit under the counter for the dishwasher and in door sink. This will require 100 amp break there. So we will need at least a 200 amp panel.
